

PURPOSE

• Describe an innovative distance education strategy that enhances & expedites graduation rates of nurses pursuing doctoral education desiring to become faculty at schools of nursing.

BACKGROUND/RATIONALE

- The Covid-19 pandemic & its subsequent surges have all but decimated the nursing workforce in many parts of the country.
- It is critical to build the nursing workforce of the future now.
- Faculty vacancies through retirement and career changes may result in qualified applicants being turned away from nursing programs.
- Nurse faculty prepared at the doctoral level are needed to complete graduate programs as timely as possible.
- Consortiums such as the Nursing Education Xchange (NEXus) can help expedite program completion of future faculty desperately needed to educate the next generation of nurses.



DESCRIPTION

- In the early 2000s, the Western Institute of Nursing explored ways of educating doctoral-prepared nurse educators & researchers through shared *complementary* resources across institutions.
- The Nursing Education Exchange (NEXus) was inaugurated in 2005.
- The NEXus consortium has grown from four participating schools to 16, offering over 250 courses.

- Students in schools participating in the consortium may take any offered course from participating NEXus schools.
- Course credit is considered as if it were taken at the home institution.
- Courses are delivered on-line.


• NEXus eases institutional faculty shortages and associated costs by providing doctoral educated faculty without having to spend funds on faculty searches, hiring, & course development for classes already available through the Consortium.

INSTITUTIONAL INCOME + COST SAVINGS

OUTCOMES

- As of January 2022, there are 441 graduates earning PhDs & DNPs from participating universities that have taken a NEXus course.
- In a recent satisfaction survey of students (n=80), 96% agreed that enrolling in a NEXus course facilitated their remaining "on time" in their program of study.
- Over half of survey respondents (n=83) enrolled in a NEXus course because it was not offered at their home institution.
- A needs rating of 4.23 (out of 5) was reported by 85% of respondents that their NEXus course met their current needs.



CONCLUSIONS

- A key strategy to ameliorating a critical nursing workforce shortage, is to have sufficient faculty educated to teach the future nurses needed to meet the health care needs of the nation.
- Increasing the higher education throughput of nursing faculty is a priority.
- Consortiums such as NEXus help potential nursing faculty have choice and flexibility in their graduate curriculum.
- Students stay on track and graduate on time.

IMPLICATIONS FOR NURSING

Nursing workforce issues cannot be solved without a sustainable pipeline of nursing faculty. Through course sharing, NEXus can help expedite the next generation of faculty.
